The youth (18+) get the opportunity to learn more about municipal government, while advancing their skills and building relationships for future opportunities. Additionally interns work with their assigned offices to complete engagement and/or policy projects during their internship.




2024 Civic Youth Interns

My Showcase Presentation


Concerns surrounding community safety are increasing, and our current solution surrounding policing isn't as effective as it costs.

Intercultural Learning within Reconciliation


Throughout my tenure at the High Level Office of Reconciliation and Anti-Racism, I have been privy to a number of learning experiences immersed in local Indigenous



communities and Indigenous knowledge. I collaborated with the Boyle Street Education Centre and formulated an event that aimed to explore intercultural learning and what that entails in the context of reconciliation. The event was spent in learning circles and roundtables with Elder Jo Wood. This allowed the other fellows to partake in a smudging ceremony, learn from a knowledge keeper and also created a safe space for attendees to delve into their individual experiences as racialized persons. This event highlighted that, in any form of policy creation, there needs to be an intentional and meaningful engagement with Indigenous communities to ensure community needs are being accounted for and vulnerable populations are met where they are.

My badge not only granted me access to these invaluable experiences but also immersed me in the expansive realm of transit programs tailored for diverse user needs. Lighthouse: Database Expansion and Mural Proposal

I undertook two projects relating to *Lighthouse*, a technology solution developed by the City of Edmonton to address the proliferation of hate symbols across the city. I researched and identified different hate symbol databases for potential collaboration and actively worked on developing partnerships.

In addition, I leveraged the data collected by *Lighthouse* to pinpoint locations and types of public art/murals that would counter the presence of historic hate symbols in public spaces within the City of Edmonton.

for quiet and reflection, usually explored through Islamic calligraphy.






Snapshots of Us
