Project overview

Neighbourhood and Alley Renewal in Gariepy is anticipated to begin in spring 2024. Through the City's Neighbourhood Renewal Program, we will reconstruct roads, curbs, replace street lights, repair sidewalks and, where possible, address missing links to support people who bike, walk and roll. Alley Renewal will also be included and involves alley reconstruction and repaving, improvements to surface drainage where possible and upgrading of existing lighting to LED fixtures.

Cost-sharing opportunities will be made available through the Local Improvement process for sidewalk reconstruction and decorative street light upgrades in the neighbourhood. Other opportunities to improve City-owned parks and public spaces will also be explored.

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Neighbourhood and Alley Renewal in Gariepy is expected to be a two-year construction process in the area shown in the map. The new infrastructure will provide enhancements to the neighbourhood for the next 30 to 50 years.

Roadmap to Building Great Neighbourhoods

The Neighbourhood and Alley Renewal program follows the roadmap below. At each step, the Project Team shares with you how your input will inform the decisions being made.

This report highlights the input received during the **Exploring Options and Tradeoffs** stage in October 2022.



Public engagement spectrum

The City of Edmonton (the City) seeks input from residents to help guide the project. The City's public engagement spectrum, below, shows the four levels of influence the public can have on decisions made by the City throughout the project.

The public was invited to provide input that would help:

+ **REFINE** options for renewing Gariepy's roads, sidewalks, alleys, street lights and open spaces and the final vision of the renewal work

Decision making process

The City makes decisions using a combination of policy and program information, public engagement input, technical requirements and available funding. This process helps to ensure the decisions we make are fiscally responsible, align with best practices, consider the existing public and private infrastructure, land uses and activities in the neighbourhood and result in the best outcomes for our city.

City policies and programs such as the Complete Streets Design and Construction Standards, Safe Mobility Strategy and Winter City Strategy provide the overall direction for Neighbourhood and Alley Renewal designs. As each neighbourhood is unique, the Project Team asks for input from residents who live, work and play in the neighbourhood and considers technical aspects such as roadway widths and conflicts with utilities and trees to determine what will fit in the neighbourhood.



What we did & how we asked

The Gariepy Neighbourhood and Alley Renewal Project Team organized a number of opportunities during the **Exploring Options and Tradeoffs** stage. These opportunities were available for the public to share their thoughts on the most important considerations when looking at the design options presented. This input will help the Project Team **REFINE** the options into a draft design.



Surveys

- An online survey was available from October 12–30, 2022. We shared specific ideas for Neighbourhood and Alley Renewal in Gariepy and asked the public questions to help the Project Team **REFINE** these options
- + Paper copies were made available upon request with a drop-off box near the Lessard Community League to return completed paper surveys

Community Workshops

- + Online community workshops took place on October 19 and 22, 2022. Both events introduced the different options for Gariepy Neighbourhood and Alley Renewal. Project Team members shared opportunities and tradeoffs associated with each option
- + Participants were encouraged to ask questions and complete the online survey following the event

Community Conversations

- Project Team members reached out to six community groups to share opportunities to participate. These included the Lessard Community League, Centennial Elementary School, Lessard Mall and Muslim Association of Canada Islamic Centre, St. Anthony's Ukrainian Orthodox Church, Carriage Lane Condominiums and Lessard Village
- + The Gariepy Community Committee, made up of 10 community members, met in June and September of 2022. This group helped us draft the Vision and Guiding Principles as well as provided feedback to guide the engagement opportunities
- + Additional emails and phone calls from community members received by the Project Manager will also be included along with the overall feedback

+ Overall there were 1,201 participants who visited the project webpage to view photos, review documents and read multiple project pages.

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Communication Tactics

- + 1,000 postcards were delivered to Gariepy addresses advertising engagement opportunities
- + Emails were sent to 113 subscribers and local stakeholders
- + Signage was located throughout the community, including a road sign on Callingwood Road, two A-frame signs near Gariepy Ravine and 20 lawn signs on public boulevards throughout the neighbourhood
- + Project information was shared online through the project web page and online by the Lessard Community League
- + A drop-off box was installed outside the Lessard Community Hall that was used to collect public feedback and share information about engagement opportunities

What we heard

The following sections include a summary of what we heard at the online workshops, in conversations and through the paper and online surveys. The summary has been developed to reflect the relevancy, frequency and diversity of the responses we received based on the questions that were asked to participants.

Confirmation of Vision and Guiding Principles

In the previous phase of engagement, **Building a Project Vision and Exploring Opportunities**, we worked with the community to **CO-CREATE** a neighbourhood Vision statement and a set of Guiding Principles. This Vision will be used to guide decision making for Neighbourhood Renewal. The Guiding Principles are ideas that inform how the Vision should be applied to the neighbourhood design.

During the **Exploring Options and Tradeoffs** phase of engagement, we presented the Vision and Guiding Principles to the community through the survey and during the online workshops. When asked, participants confirmed the Vision and Guiding Principles reflected the current and future needs of the community.

Vision

Gariepy is a welcoming, friendly, active and involved community that looks out for one another. Our neighbourhood is culturally and generationally diverse. Our residents are well connected to parks, ravines, schools, commercial services, neighbouring communities and the North Saskatchewan River Valley. We take pride in our community and value social gatherings with our neighbours. We enjoy actively experiencing the beautiful, safe, serene and peaceful surroundings that Gariepy has to offer.

Guiding Principles

Maintain the existing vibrancy and connection to nature that characterises the neighbourhood and makes it feel like a "hidden gem" Ensure parks and open spaces are attractive, welcoming, safe and provide a range of recreational amenities that are usable for all ages and abilities

Ensure infrastructure like pathways, roads and sidewalks, consider yearround use, improving winter useability and visual appeal Ensure parks and open spaces are attractive, welcoming, safe and provide a range of recreational amenities that are usable for all ages and abilities

Guiding Principles

Improve the condition, safety and accessibility of roadways, crossings and sidewalks for all users including people who walk, roll, bike and drive Create spaces in parks and commercial areas for residents to gather with friends and family and each other to build a sense of community and maintain the friendliness of the neighbourhood

Protect existing natural spaces and improve neighbourhood sustainability and climate resiliency by adding vegetation, reducing hard surfacing and other innovations Establish connections to destinations and amenities within and outside of the neighbourhood



Exploring Options and Tradeoffs

The following is a summary of what we heard during the **Exploring Options and Tradeoffs** stage. All feedback collected will be considered in the development of the draft design. The draft design will be shared for community feedback in spring 2023. All designs are subject to final approvals and funding.

Roadway redesign: How you travel around your neighbourhood (drive, bike, walk or roll)

Participants shared perspectives and feedback on a series of proposed changes to roadways in the neighbourhood, including new bike infrastructure, boulevards and traffic calming. What we heard in response to these options is included below.

Potential measures to slow traffic

Changes were proposed to address speeding or shortcutting traffic on roads within Gariepy and enhance safety for people biking, walking and rolling at road crossings.

Enhanced connections: How you walk, bike, roll and move around your neighbourhood

Participants shared perspectives and feedback on a series of proposed changes to enhance connections within and to surrounding neighbourhoods as part of Neighbourhood Renewal. What we heard in response to these options is included below.

Breezeways

Changes were proposed to the design of breezeways throughout Gariepy to enhance accessibility and safety for people biking, walking and rolling.

What is a breezeway?

A breezeway is a public pathway that runs in–between two private properties. Wider breezeways and pathways make it easier for people who walk and bike to move around the neighbourhood. They enhance accessibility and connectivity within the neighbourhood.

Shared Street Connections

Green alley connections

Changes were proposed to enhance connectivity and accessibility of green alleys located throughout Gariepy by people biking, walking and rolling.

What is a green alley?

In the Gariepy neighbourhood there are three parcels of City–owned land (alley right–of–ways) between private properties with gas, sewer and other utilities. These spaces are currently grassed with no hard surfacing like a typical alley. For the purposes of engaging with the public they are being called "green alleys".

Gariepy Park

Place-making opportunities: How we gather and enjoy

unique community features

Participants shared perspectives and feedback on a series of proposed improvements to parks and Cityowned green spaces as a part of Neighbourhood Renewal. What we heard in response to these options is included below.

Entrance areas

Changes were proposed to enhance the entrance to Gariepy at the intersections of 55 Avenue and Lessard Road, 57 Avenue and Lessard Road, 59 Avenue and Lessard Road and 172 Street and Callingwood Road.

Corner store area

Community-led opportunities

What is a community-led project?

A community-led project is an opportunity for the community to collaborate and is carried out by a group of neighbourhood members. This group creates a vision for the project, a schedule and a budget. These projects can occur on or in public or private land and facilities. These projects can lead to programming or infrastructure. The City of Edmonton can support these projects by providing staff and resources. Neighbourhood Resource Coordinators (NRC) support communities on many projects such as park enhancements, murals and programming.

Community–led opportunities are fundraised and often maintained by residents or the community. The City has a number of grants to help contribute to community projects. Other organizations have grants available for community projects as well, such as the Government of Alberta and Edmonton Community Foundation. Other partnerships with businesses or associations can also fund community projects.

Maintenance of community-led infrastructure may be the responsibility of the community or be a shared responsibility with the City. The level of support provided by the City is project specific and would be identified through the Community-Led Construction process.



What we heard during public engagement

Several ideas for community-led opportunities were proposed throughout the design package. The following is a list of those opportunities and the community feedback received on these community-led options.
