Water for Firefighting

In Alberta, water supply for firefighting is regulated both by municipalities through the Alberta Environment Standards for Municipal Waterworks, as well as through the National Building Code - Alberta Edition (NBC-AE). The key difference between the application of these standards is when they are applied relative to a planned development, with the former occurring at municipal land development applications including subdivision and Development Permit stages, and the latter occurring at the Building Permit stage.
