5.	Project Update	

<u>City Up</u>	<u>odate</u>
•	Partnerships Manager, explained his role on the project as working closely with the project's communications and engagement team, the contractor and the community to listen and be responsive to concerns. Marigold Infrastructure Partners (MIP) has been selected to build the Valley Line West. Construction will begin this year and will last for up to 6 years. The City has also issued an RFP for new trains with a plan to select a proponent by the end of the year. The City is emphasizing open communication and access to information through the LRT team, ensuring special needs and circumstances are considered, providing empathy regarding disruption, and applying a "boots on the ground" approach to stakeholder relations. Committee and community members who haven't already done so are encouraged to sign up for mailing lists, call with questions, and provide feedback wherever possible. It was noted that Marigold is setting up mailing lists and has its own contact points to share construction-related information. (public@marigoldinfra.ca; 780-412-2183)

Marigo	ld Update
٠	Jeri of Marigold explained that Marigold Infrastructure Partners is a partnership between Colas (the parent company of Standard General) and the engineering firm Parsons. Both companies combine a strong local presence with international experience, and the team is currently being built.
•	MIP is committed to being a good neighbour by reducing disruption and neighbourhood inconvenience as much as possible. The presentation reviewed the Valley Line West alignment and renderings of the Lewis Farms facility, the stations at West Edmonton
٠	Mall and Misericordia Hospital and the 87 Avenue elevated guideway. This construction season will focus on early works including geotechnical investigations (which will have some off-peak traffic impacts), tree removal, utility relocations and foundations for the elevated guideway.
•	Design and Planning will also be happening this year.

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	 volumes resulting from the COVID situation. There will also be local conversations if there is flexibility to adapt the construction approach to neighbourhood preferences. There will be a close working relationship between the City and Marigold to ensure that community interests and concerns collected by the City in past engagement and communications are passed along. In response to a question about guarantees for on-time delivery of the light rail vehicles, which are being procured separately, it was explained that the procurement process takes into account the time required for fabrication, delivery and testing, but details won't be finalized until a contract is awarded. There was a question about how much of the recent renovations to the West Edmonton Mall constitute "throwaway" costs. The response indicated that it was not possible to defer the essential repairs but the work was designed and implemented with the new LRT station in mind to avoid throwaway costs when the new combined station/permanent transit centre is built in the same location. The potential neighbourhood disruption of overnight drilling of boreholes was raised as a concern. It was explained that the timing is to minimize the impact on traffic, and the noise is expected to be minimal (somewhat like white noise) and short in duration. Participants were assured that the signalling system for Valley Line West and Valley Line Southeast will be fully integrated. 	
6.	Round Table	
	 There was discussion regarding the plan for communications, with a concern over too much reliance on Citizen Working Groups. There will be several methods of early communication, including printed materials, updates to the Valley Line West page on the City website, an updated Valley Line West booklet, social media, SMS (text) updates and mailing lists. In collaboration with MIP, additional methods will be added to ensure information issued in advance of work. Community events could provide opportunities to engage in outreach. There are several points of contact for questions and concerns. A variance has been issued as part of the development permit for the temporary transit centre. It was explained that, with the limited space being developed for the temporary use, this variance permits less landscaping than would normally be required. The regular landscaping requirement will be restored when the land is returned for redevelopment after the temporary use, and trees that have been removed will have to be replaced. There was concern that the distribution of zoning-related notices might not reach enough of the interested community due to distance from the land to be used by the temporary transit centre. It was suggested that this conversation, which relates to Planning and Development rules and practices, could be continued separately. The footbridge over 170 St was briefly discussed, and there is a plan in place to replace it. However, it is a separate project. A participant suggested that densification be discussed at a future meeting. The project team indicated this could occur in the context of explaining transit-oriented development within the new City Plan, but it will not affect the Valley Line West LRT design. 	

	 A participant asked for more frequent meetings, and more frequent information "bursts".
