



40 km/h - Key Facts

Starting August 6, the speed limit will be 40 km/h on most residential and downtown streets.

Why:

- 40 km/h makes our streets calmer, quieter, and safer.
- 40 km/h means drivers will have more time to react and avoid a collision.
- 40 km/h will help us reach our goal of Vision Zero; zero traffic-related fatalities and serious injuries in Edmonton by 2032.

Where:

- When in effect, 40 km/h will include most residential streets and downtown streets, including parts of Whyte Avenue and Jasper Avenue.
- The speed limit will be 40 km/h on all roads where you do not see a speed limit sign.
- This will not impact most major roads around the city and will have little impact on driving times around Edmonton.
- The Interactive Map is helpful to look-up which roads will have the new speed limit.

Education:

- An extensive public education campaign will now begin so Edmontonians are aware of the change.
- Edmontonians can be part of the change. The Safe Speeds Toolkit includes tools to tell your friends, family and neighbours about how 40 km/h increases drivers' field of vision, gives everyone more time to react, and reduces the likelihood of tragic crashes. Enforcement:

- A grace period will be in effect for automated enforcement locations with new speed limits to help drivers adjust their behaviour.
- Enforcement with automated enforcement will start on September 1, this will help to protect our most vulnerable road users as they return to school.

Speed Limit Signs:

- As of May 1, 2021, the City began adding, removing and updating speed limit signs where required. As part of this project, the City developed a refreshed speed limit signage approach that will reduce the number of signs on our streets wherever possible.
- At this time, there are no impacts to drivers, and any new 40 km/h signs are bagged/covered once installed to avoid driver confusion before changes are effective.
