

This project evaluates the long-term use of Edmonton's downtown bike grid using ten years of ridership data (2015–2025).

Findings show consistently high seasonal usage, strong recovery from temporary dips and steady year-round ridership - highlighting the grid's enduring role in supporting active, sustainable transportation.

Trades Sustainability Using the Global Network Of Learning Cities (GNLC) Principles

EPS Operating Budget Analysis

This work contributed to internal discussions about how population growth, inflation and fiscal constraints shape police funding in Edmonton.

Pakistani-Canadian who has a passion for building social communities for children. I am also passionate about re-shaping public health in places where it is not a priority.




Building Communities Through Partnership and Policy

Building Bridges: From Policy to Community Empowerment

During my 2025 Civic Youth Fellowship with the City of Edmonton, I spearheaded initiatives that championed equity and inclusion, directly impacting community services. My contributions were pivotal in the CRC Equity Plan, where I was instrumental in bridging the gap and bringing vital Indigenous voices to the forefront of policy development. I also played a key role in the 2SLGBTQIA+ Action Plan, ensuring its framework was enriched by diverse perspectives. EFRS Reintegration Program Evaluation and Awareness

My project was an evaluation of the reintegration program at Edmonton Fire Rescue Services and its effectiveness on assisting firefighters in their return to work through a peer-facilitated exposure program. It also included supplementary materials to allow for a reintegration program specific to fire fighting across Canada and for its establishment in different provinces/cities. The main focus of my work was on the health and wellbeing of firefighters, highlighting the areas of growth that still need to be targeted within first-responder wellness programs as a whole.
