on Sept. 26-27.
This is the second time Robinson has been put on the nomination ballot.

"You never know how it will go when people are voting," laughed

He is being inducted to the hall not only in recognition of his many riding accomplishments, but also for his volunteer work within the rodeo community. He served as-president of the Canadian Pro-fessional Rodeo Association from fessional Rodeo Association from 1980-81 and again from 2004-05, as was also president of the Cana-dian Senior Pro Hodeo Association from 1995-97 and president of the Canadian Rodeo Cowboys Association from 1973-74. Robinson cites starting the Cana-

dien Finals Rodeo in Edmonton as one of his biggest accomplish-

"I think that's my legacy to this rodeo business," he commented. "It's been very successful and everyone has benefited from it and even the Americans can come up bere now and ride."

Of his many riding accomplish-ments, Robinson cites his win as the 1953 All Around Champion in Edmonson as une of his proudest moments. As a young 22-year-old rider, it was his first win as a profes-

"It was my first major win and I think I won \$800. That was a lot of muney back then and it's not too bad now," he joked.

bad now," he joked.
"If you wan a crapple thensand at a rodeo back then, you had a really good radeo."

come from his days as a bronc and boll rider.

In 1962, Robinson qualified for bull riding at the National Pinals Hodeo in Los Arigeles and won the average. He was the first Canadian to win a major event at the National

Two window washers were trapped for more than an hour Wednesday on scaffolding dangling 69 stories up the side of 1 World Trade Center before firefighters cut through the glass and pulled them to safety.

The dramatic rescue oc

The dramatic rescue occurred on the south side of the 194-storey building, where the open-topped platform hung at about a 45-fer gree angle and swayed slightly in the wind.

The fire department said the workers were tethered and communicating with res-

apparently broke at about 1 p.m., according to low Pentp.m., according to Joe Pent-angelo of the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, which owns the building. Rescuers could be seen

thick glass was 6 feet tall, even with rescuers' heads as they stood at the precipice. The workers were brought through it at about 2:15 p.m.

Wetaskiwin library seeks funding changes for First Nations services

Funding is great, but distribution rules need work

By Amelia Naismith The Pipestone Flyer

The City of Wetaskiwin Library Board is urging the Ministry of Municipal Affairs to create a more streamlined process to allow libraries to access funding for First Nations services.

Late last year the Wetaskiwin Public Library

received \$25,000. However, the funds dictated by Municipal Affairs are given in whole to the Yellowhead Regional Library and from there. Wetaskiwin can apply for a grant for a portion of the funds.

Yellowhead receives (funds) based on the number of First Nations populations in the city," said city cosncillor June Boyda, chair of the City of Wetaskovin Library Board.

A letter signed by Boyda, in her capacity as chair, addressed to Shaye Anderson. Minister of Municipal Affairs, states, "While the princi-pal and intent of this initiative is incredible, the distribution method is not. We are respectfully requesting that this funding be distributed directly to the individual libraries impacted by the increased service provision."

The board is also requesting a review of the First Nations populations assigned to each library/

While the city sees library patrons from the four First Nations Bands at Maskwacis — Ermineskin Cree Nation, Louis Bull Cree Nation, Montana First Nation, and Samson Cree Nation - the library is only designated to recognize Ermineskin Cree Nation and a portion of Samson Cree

"The City of Wetaskiwin sees as much as, or more, traffic from each of the First Nations than southern trading centres such as Ponoka, where the balance of the funding was directed. The tax base from the residents of Wetaskiwin simply cannot absorb the full amount of the difference in the value of library services being provided by the Wetaskiwin Public Library," states the letter.

With the funds the Wetaskinvin Public Library received it has been able to offer book clubs and early literacy programs on-site at the Nipsis Cafe and Collective, conduct outreach visits to schools, participate in job fairs to make residents aware of employment related resources, work with the healing lodge Pê Sâkhstêw Centre to encourage literacy development within the incarcerated population, hire an indigenous library services coordinator, and eliminate library membership fees for First Nations members.

"We want to keep things open for everybody so there's no harriers," said Boyda.

She added the city and county Wetaskiwin residents already enjoyed free library memberships and, since the decision to eliminate the fees for First Nations members, more than 300 new memberships have come from Maskwacis.

The Wetaskiwin Lions Club donated \$1,000 to the local Catholic Social Services Mar. 13, Dakin, Linns member Bobby Kalipersoud and CSS representative Gleen Dokken.

MOM BLASTS JUDGE 'BIAS'

Justice's tears cited in appeal for new trial

CALGARY - Tears apparently shed by a judge while convicting a Calgary woman of first-degree murder in the starvationrelated death of her son. could come back to haunt

her. Rodica Radita, in a notice filed at the Alberta Court of Appeal in Calgary, said Justice Karen Horner's apparent emotional display showed the Court of Queen's Bench judge was "lam not guilty of

murdering my son," Radita said, in a notice of appeal printed in her own hand.

"And the judge finding that I am shows that she did not look at all of the evidence and that she did not understand how to properly apply the law,"

"The judge's crying during my case (closin arguments and while reading her decision) demonstrates that she was bias," she wrote. "Saying that my arguments were 'nonsensical' when they

bias and inability to decide my case on the facts rather than on emotion."

Rodica and her husband Emil, were found guilty last month of first-degree murder in the May 7, 2013, death of their 15-year-old son, Alexandru. The boy weighed a mere

37 lb, when he died of bacterial sepsis related to starvation.

Homer ruled the parents intentionally neglected the teen, who had type 1 diabetes, for years, until he finally succumbed to his

your son Alex to death are beyond comprehension, Homer said, in ordering the couple to each serve a minimum 25 years without

STAR Catholic updates Capital Plan At the March 15 meeting, St. Thomas Aqui-nas Regional (STAR) Catholic school division yoted to update their capital plan, bringing the number three priority of building a high school in Beaumont to the number two posi-tion, and moving the Christ the King School modernization down to the number three position. The first priority remains moderniz-ing the Father Lacombe School in Lacombe, said board chair Thalia Hibbs.

"The reason that Beaumont moved up is because there is no high school currently for STAR Catholic in Beaumont, and we can see that the numbers, especially in the lower grades, have really ballooned," Hibbs said in an interview, "We need to start advocat-ing for that now so that ideally it will match around the time that that's needed in Beau-

mont.

The board is working with Beaumont administration to earmark land for the new school, and have been diligent in their advocacy to local governments about the needs they're seeing. The board chair said local trustee Dan Chalifoux has been a major factor in getting their needs in Beaumont

As for the Father Lacombe School, the board has been tirelessly advocating to the provincial government on the need for a modernization, which would essentially see

the majority of the building rebuilt in a mod-ern fashion. Hibbs said the current building was built around the '50s, and has been slated for renew since the STAR Catholic board took over the school around 2005.

"It's an old surplus school that was adapted to our purposes, so it is lacking a proper sci-ence lab. The administration area is very haphazard, the library is just a little classroom. Overall, it's just inadequate," she said. The board was hoping to see this project

announced in the province's 2017 budget, but that doesn't mean they're anywhere close to giving up.

"We definitely were very hopeful, and cer-tainly, we were disappointed, but we will just knuckle down and do some advocating and really hope to see that it is on the next capital plan," Hibbs said.



"We're not prepared for it," happening to everyone around us. No one is immune.

The gist of the day will be bearing how to communic and interact with people who will learn new skills that they

practice, skills that are simple but require attention.

King said those with dementia don't know their condition. so there isn't much the can do to adapt. It's up to their family, friends and loved ones to learn those new skills.
King said her own experience

working with those suffering dementia began with war vet erans who were aged, some around 100 years of age. But after she moved to Alberta and started working, she noticed some of the residents were only in their mid-60's, and she knew one who had Parkinson's and mild dementia and was only 52 years of age.

"The dementia was show-ing up maybe two, three, four years before too," said king. She noted that as sufferen get younger, they will live longer with demostia and friends and

A: Yes and no. Dementia is an nimbrel-

la term for several different kinds of brain change or brain injury. Alchemer's is only one of approximately 100-120 different types

Q: Is dementia just about memory loss?

Demonitia is brain failure
Q: What does that mean?

A: The human loain is made up of wiring. The challenge with dementia is that all of the wiring goes on the fritz and then dies. Q: How does this impact the lives of those

living with demential

A: Human beings learn and grow and de-velop a high level of skill over a lifetime. As dementia progresses (no matter what type it is) we will lose those skills over time. Dementia interferes with our ability to com-municate with others so we cannot make our

needs and desires known Q: What is your goal for the workshop? A: The goal is to help people remain in a healthy relationship with a person whose beain is changing right up until the end of life. We must upend the way we think about dementia. Rather than focus on accumular-ing Josses, we should be paying attention to preserved abilities, those things a person with dements can still do. In other words, we must learn to use what they have left.

Q: What else will we learn at the work-

shop?

Leduc County council provides second readings for four Saunders Lake-related bylaws

The Tuesday, April 4 meeting of Leduc County council included second readings for four bylaws pertaining to the Saunders Lake

The first was a bylaw to amend the Intermunicipal Development Plan. As agenda documents explained, the IDP was originally presented to council in October 2016. Since then, public feedback highlighted some con-cerns that administration was now looking to address with the proposed bylaw amend-

The changes proposed in the amendment

were stated in the agenda as follows:

- "Additional text to section 4.6.2.18 to require the exploration of a wildlife corridor during the detail design of the Spine Road between 65th Ave and Rollyview Road, in addition to the existing proposal to require exploration at detailed [Area Structure Plan], Outline Plan and subdivision stages.

- "Strengthening the language related to the required building types within policy area B of the plan area."

- "Strengthening the language relating to the requirement of landscaping of future electrical substations in the plan area."

The second bylaw presented to council concerned a bylaw amendment to the Leduc County Municipal Development Plan.

This proposed bylaw amendment would see the county include the north-eastern area of Saunders Lake as a Special Study

Overlay Area land-use designation. Agenda documents stated this would allow for the

consideration of future residential land use, required through the creation of an ASP. Despite a public hearing on the matter that saw a few issues raised regarding the bylaw as written, administration was recommend-ing council proceed with the bylaw without

further changes.

The third bylaw for council to tackle was a bylaw to rescind the current ASP for Saunders Lake. This was being done in order to ensure alignment with the proposed bylaw ensure alignment with the proposed bylaw amendments concerning the joint Leduc County-City of Leduc IDP and the county's MDP. A public hearing regarding this pro-posed bylaw amendment saw some resi-dents object to the rescinding as they felt it provided the best future for the lands. Meanwhile, administration explained some resi-dents were in favour of rescinding the plan in order to "realize the vision" of the proposed IDP and MDP amendments.

The fourth and final bylaw concerning the

Saunders Lake area was a bylaw amendr to adopt the proposed Northwest Saunders Lake Area Structure Plan. Agenda documentation explained the proposed ASP would aim for a "primarily employment driven future land use concept within a 601ha boundary, located north of Township Road 500, south of Airport Road, west of Saunders Lake and east of the City of Leduc's eastern boundary." The ASP would propose three main land use policy areas, including a Natural Area and Open Space immediately adiacent to Saunders Lake, a Saunders Lake Tran-

sitional as a low-impact development buffer and a Saunders Lake Business proposed for light and medium industry.

A public hearing on the matter saw a few concerns raised, including environmental impacts, a need for more protective policies and the need for existing natural features to

be incorporated, just to name a few. Despite these concerns, administration was not recmmending any changes be made to the bylaw at this time. Each of the four bylaws were presented to council for second readings, all of which were given by unanimous

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

Edmonton Seeks Boundary Adjustment

Process aims to secure vital economic growth corridor, ensure strong core for sustainable regional prosperity



Edmonton City Council directed Administration to begin a process to extend the City's southern boundary to facilitate responsible growth in

The proposed boundary extension includes the corridor along the west side of the QE II Highway and encompasses the Edmonton International Airport.

This area would secure lands to accommodate strong demand for residential, business and employment growth within the City, which provides - and funds - the majority of infrastructure and support services in the metro region. A City administered corridor would also better facilitate the future LRT extension to the Airport.

"For Edmonton, this process is about securing land to accommodate natural growth along our southern boundary," said Mayor Stephen Mandel. "We are continuing a discussion we started with the Leduc County a year ago to bring the right combination of infrastructure, municipal services and orderly growth management to a growth area that is vital to the future of our whole Capital Region."

The land was identified as a priority growth area by the Capital Region Board, which oversees a region with 3.8% growth expected in 2013. Edmonton is seeking to manage the anticipated development, and apply Edmonton's higher density and urban standards such as site servicing and enhanced traffic management.

"Edmonton is the employment, educational, cultural and social hub of the entire Capital Region. Completing this process will provide the infrastructure needed for our region's promising growth," says Mayor Mandel. "With these extensions of our boundary, we help manage growth in a way that avoids patchwork infrastructure, facilitates growth to an urban standard, avoids traffic congestion with integrated planning, and secures a commercial and growth tax base needed to help pay for the benefits we provide to the entire region."

The City of Edmonton has sent a notice of intent to proceed with 2 annexation applications to the Municipal Government Board of the Government of Alberta, as well as to Leduc County and the Town of Beaumont. The process, which includes extensive consultation, can take 2 to 5 years.

The application also proposes extending Edmonton's southern boundary to Township Road 510 near the northern edge of the Town of Beaumont and east of QE II Highway. This extension would allow continued growth of residential neighbourhoods currently developed at one of the highest density standards in the region. This proposed annexation does not include the lands within the Leduc County Nisku Industrial Area.

The City of Edmonton and Leduc County have been in collaborative discussions since April 2012. Discussions have been guided by the terms of a joint letter of intent to review the planning and development of lands in this area to an urban standard in compliance with the principles and objectives of the Gapital Region Growth Plan.

The proposed boundary adjustments ensure land is available for a balance of residential and commercial development Edmonton needs to be sustainable for the long term. The commercial area up to and including the Airport has significant economic potential for the region and will help Edmonton to continue to fund amenities, infrastructure and opportunities that benefit the Capital Region.

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"A strong, sustainable city at the core is vital to ensuring the entire region can compete in the global market and continue to attract investment, business and jobs," says Mayor Mandel. "It is only fair for the municipality at the centre, with 70% of the region's population, be able to grow and foster economic diversity."

While boundary adjustments between neighbouring municipalities is a procedure laid out in the Municipal Government Act to ensure communities can have a long-term supply of land for future growth, this is the first annexation process Edmonton has undertaken in 30 years, compared with 16 in the Calgary area.

The City's Municipal Development Plan requires a 30-year supply of land for future growth. Edmonton has not required to adjust its boundaries due to good planning for 3 decades, but some natural growth areas of the City do not have room to expand.

 - . Unless mutually agreed, the City of Edmonton's boundary will not shift again into Leduc County until joint planning for that area has been completed.
 - The inclusion of EIA lands in the annexation will be determined over the next several months. through a collaborative exercise between Leduc County, the City of Edmonton and the EIA.

"This agreement demonstrates that a collaborative approach is a better way to support future economic growth and livable communities," says Mayor Don Iveson. "We all have high aspirations for the region. This acknowledges both Edmonton and Leduc County's commitment to balance growth needs while still reducing the region's overall need for land."

Edmonton and Leduc County reach agreement on annexation

The City of Edmonton and Leduc County have reached an agreement on the city's application to annex lands in the county, proposed to take effect on Jan. 1, 2019.

The Annexation Agreement, signed this morning at Edmonton International Airport (EIA), details an uncontested annexation area of 6.235 hectares (15.400 acres) of land west of the Queen Elizabeth II (QEII) Highway and 2,625 hectares (6,485 acres) of land east of the QEII Highway (see attached map).

"The past three years of negotiations have not been easy and both municipalities worked extremely hard to come to an agreement that would benefit our residents and the entire Edmonton metropolitan region," says Leduc County Mayor John Whaley. "Our positions on annexation evolved into collaborative conversations that took into account the bigger picture and how this decision would affect not only us but our municipal partners and EIA. I'm proud to say our collaborative approach to this annexation agreement will benefit the entire region and has paved the way for future regional partnerships."


"The agreement is a significant achievement for the City and the County in demonstrating that a collaborative outcome can be reached in spite of the scale and complexity of the decision to be made," says Edmonton Mayor Don Iveson. "Functioning effectively as a region, to me, is about working together for the greater good and supporting the health of our whole regional economy. This Agreement has led to a deeper understanding that future collaboration needs to consider sub-regional interests, like EIA, rather than those of individual municipalities alone."

The agreement also details that the city's boundary will not shift further into Leduc County until ioint planning for that area has been completed. Furthermore, the two municipalities agreed to a 50-year tax protection provision for residents, a one-time compensation amount of \$3.2 million and 10 annual payments of \$530,000 to be paid to Leduc County.

While both the city and county reached an annexation agreement, the city must still submit its annexation application to the Municipal Government Board for the Government of Alberta to

make the final decision. In addition to the annexation agreement area, the city's application will include nine guarter sections on the east side currently in the jurisdiction of the Town of Beaumont, which are subject to negotiations between the City of Edmonton and the Town of Beaumont.

6. Smart Growth Up, In and Out: Edmonton began a process aimed at securing a vital economic growth corridor along the QE II highway and ensuring strong core for sustainable regional prosperity, while focussing efforts to increase density in central areas. In March City Council announced a process to extend the City's southern boundary to facilitate responsible growth in the region. As the first annexation process Edmonton has undertaken in 30 years, the process is expected to take two to five years. The City also launched Evolving Infill, a project to advance residential infill in the city's established neighbourhoods. The first phase aims at creating a city-wide discussion of the need to build up within established communities, working in tandem with new density guidelines for new development across the city. The City also increased opportunities for highrise development with the closure of the final runway at the City Centre Airport. This final closure will remove height restrictions on development in the central areas of the City, continuing the trend of new growth allowed by the decision in 2009 to close the first runway.

Transformational Projects and Major Events



- (February) Rogers Place The City of Edmonton and the Katz Group announced that the \$480 million Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) forRogers Place has been met and construction of the "king of the catalyst projects" would begin in March 2014 to transform the heart of our city.
- (March) Commonwealth Games Bid Edmonton announces its intention to bidfor the 2022 Commonwealth Games.
- (April) Capital City Downtown Plan The City took another major step forward
 in its revitalization of downtown, when the Province approved the Downtown
 Community Revitalization Levy (CRL) to fund numerous catalyst projects such as
 the Rogers Place arena and related infrastructure, increasing the capacity of the
 sewer system, Jasper Avenue revitalization, park development and increased
 walkability.

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- (June) Blatchford Redevelopment The Blatchford project received the green light to proceed on the plan to recycle an airport, transforming it to a "living, walking, learning," world-leading environmental community of 30,000 Edmontonians.
- (August) FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup Edmonton hosted FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup and set a record of the single most-attended U-20 women's soccer game in the FIFA U-20 World Cup Canada for the quarter-final match involving team Canada.
- (August) World Triathlon Grand Final Edmonton hosted the 2014 TransCanada Corp. World Triathlon Grand Final that brought together 3,000 athletes from 73 nations, attracted over 100,000 spectators flocking to Edmonton, drew a viewerships of 45 millions from 160 countries. More than 1,500 volunteers, 60 committee members, race captains donated their valuable time in the months, weeks and days leading up to the Grand Final. The 2014 Grand Final held in Edmonton was declared 'best ever' by the International Triathlon Union.
- (September-November) Annexation Talks The City continued major steps in the process to collaborate with its regional partners in the efforts to adjust municipal boundaries to meet growth demands and to support future land development.
