
# INQUIRING MINDS CONNECTIONS

City Hall School is one of Edmonton's many Inquiring
Minds Site Schools. Site schools offer teachers an
opportunity to move their class to a community location
for a tailored week of hands-on, experiential learning.
Throughout this engaging experience, students
immerse themselves in curriculum-related activities,
make connections with the community, engage in
real-world problem-solving tasks, and document their
experiences through journaling.

This **Beyond the Classroom Network** approach to learning was pioneered by Gillain Kydd over 25 years ago. This program is supported by both the Edmonton Public and Edmonton Catholic School Boards.






## HOW CITY HALL SCHOOL CONNECTS

City Hall School began in 2006. Since its inception, it has been offering students a hands-on approach to learning outside of the traditional classroom settings. This initiative is a collaboration between the City of Edmonton and Edmonton Public Schools and involves seconding a teacher to develop the program. Tailored to Grade 1–12 students from both the Edmonton Public and Edmonton Catholic School Boards, City Hall School provides engaging, year-long programming related to municipal government and curricular outcomes.






## CONNECTING ALL YEAR LONG

## CONNECTING WITH THE CITY







This year, several classes were recipients of United Way Dentons Make Your Mark grants for student-led projects that take action against local poverty. As students organized and ran donation drives, they had the opportunity to share their knowledge about poverty and their passion for helping others. At City Hall School, students learn that little things, like breakfast bags and socks that are donated to local organizations, can all make a difference.

Whether we welcome guest speakers into our classroom or travel around the city to meet experts, their presence brings curriculum to life and motivates students to consider possible career pathways.


Students learn how adults use creative thinking, problem-solving abilities, collaboration, effective communication, and design thinking in their jobs.

# CONNECTING WITH THE LAND AND INDIGENOUS WAYS OF KNOWING


At City Hall School, students learn that Edmonton has been a gathering place, a travelling route and a place to call home for Indigenous Peoples since time immemorial. Throughout the year, we discuss and explore the fact that we are all Treaty People. At school and at City Hall, students are given the opportunity to deepen their understanding of what it means to live on Treaty 6 Territory and on traditional Metis homeland. From Orange Shirt Day, to Metis Week, to National Indigenous Peoples Day in June, students are encouraged to use their voices to share their new knowledge and understanding with others.

Another way we make these connections is by looking at Indigenous languages and meanings — for example, learning that this place is named amiskwaciwâskahikan, meaning 'Beaver Hill House'' in Cree. Students also have the opportunity to learn firsthand about the historical and cultural meanings behind Edmonton's newly amended Wards with Indigenous names and about EPL's Thunderbird House (PÎYÊSÎW WÂSKÂHIKAN) at the Stanley Milner Library. Some classes visit and are inspired by the art at  $\dot{\Delta}\dot{\sigma}^{\circ}$  (ÎNÎW) River Lot 11 $\infty$  Indigenous Art Park and the Tawatinâ Bridge. Students also use artwork in City Hall and around the downtown core as a jumping off point to discuss the City's Indigenous Framework.
