## Why District Planning?



The City Plan (2020)

Edmonton has:

- A new Municipal Development Plan
- 375 Neighbourhoods
- 130 plans in effect

District Plans are a different approach to planning.

  - gathering general policies that apply to all districts
  - establishing 15 district plans
  - focusing on the **shift to 1.25 million** people

#### **The District General Policy & the District Plans**



#### DISTRICT GENERAL POLICY

#### Applies to all districts

Guides how districts change and grow over time. It provides policies that will guide land use, mobility, open space and infrastructure decisions to achieve the vision outlined in The City Plan.

#### 15 DISTRICT PLANS

Applies to a specific district

Each district plan will contain a district introduction, district specific policies and 9 guiding maps.

### **District General Policy - Purpose**

- Provide guidance that **applies to all districts** across the city
- Give additional direction at a level under *The City Plan*
- Strive for an equitable approach
  - to guide all areas some that have not had a local plan
  - to encourage land use & mobility integration with amenities
- Simplify policy, remove redundancies and/or inconsistencies



DISTRICT GENERAL POLICY

## **District General Policy - How we're making it**

- *The City Plan* is the **starting point**
- **Drawing from existing sources** e.g. *Transit Oriented Development Guidelines, Residential Infill Guidelines*
- **Leveraging** existing, approved and relevant policies



DISTRICT GENERAL POLICY

#### **District Plans - Purpose**

- Applies *The City Plan's* directions **at the district level**
- Illustrates, through its maps, **how the district will change** (as per *The City Plan*)
- May contain **policy exceptions** that are **specific to that district**



#### **District Plans - How we're making it**

- Applying *The City Plan's* direction at the district level
  - e.g. Nodes and Corridors Network, Mass Transit Network
- Reviewing existing plans in effect for that district
  e.g. any ASPs, NSPs, ARPs
- Compiling projects identified to support growth in the district

District Plan | Mill Woods and Meadows

#### **1.0 District Context**

The MII Woods and Meadows District is in scutheast Edmonton, separated from the rest of the city by highways and employment ands. This district comprises commercial and industrial areas from cateways Boutward to 91 Street and predominantly residential neighbourhoods east of 91 Street to the city boundary at Anthony Henday Urive. MII Woods is a collection of master planned neighbourhoods developed by the City of Edmonton beginning in the 1970s, and Fatures a town centre with surrounding residential areas and a largely curvilinear street system. The Meadows includes neighbourhoods that began to develop in the 1980s, and development continues today and pen eastern and southern edges.

The district is bounded by major radways, with Whitemud Drive to the north, Highway 2 to the west, and Anthony Henday Drive to the south and east. Several major attellal radat crisis-cross the area and connect to adjacent districts to the north Isouthess District, west (Whitemud District, and sout) (Beisrie District). To the east of the district is Strathcore Commy. The Valley line LRT connects the district northward towards Downtown Edimention. The district indudes portions of the MII Creek Ravine system, which connects the as exclogically northward to the North Statkathewan River.

#### **1.1 District Measures**

District Plans are part of the response to advance Edmonton towards the targets identified in the City Plan. Some of these targets will be achieved by actions at the district calle, and contributions to meeting the targets by each district collectively will help to advance towards the city-wide target. City Plan targets are identified according to the City Plan five Big City Moves, which are bold, transformative priorities that can create a different set of opportunities for Edmonton.
