### REAL WOMEN exhibit

- Art Gallery of Alberta/Alberta Art Foundation Traveling Exhibition Program (TREX)
- Group exhibit curated by Shane Golby of the AGA. The exhibit is travelling through Alberta from August 2019 to September 2021 and will be on display in schools, libraries, museums, and other community facilities.

# SKETCHING HISTORY: Rediscovering Edmonton's Architectural Heritage through Urban Sketching

- *Sketching History* is a group exhibit that I curated featuring sketches from members of Urban Sketchers Edmonton of the city's built and natural heritage, as well as photographs and paintings from the City of Edmonton Archives. These are exhibited alongside background stories that I researched and wrote for the heritage locations that we sketched. There were approximately 120 people in attendance at the launch, and the exhibit is in place for one year beginning November 20, 2019 at the Prince of Wales Armouries and City Archives.

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## PUBLIC REQUESTS

I was both gratified and surprised by the large number of public requests for my advice and information (119 requests from April 2018 to end February 2020). Although I defined my term fairly narrowly as interpreting the role through archives and my art practice, the public expectations of the role were very wide ranging. These included:

- Advice on family archives and questions about varied aspects of Edmonton's history
- Requests for my advice and/or participation in individual and group history-based projects
- Requests for speaking engagements

I accepted as many speaking engagements as I was able. I provided advice as well as referrals to archives and other sources and/or names of people in the heritage field who specialize in particular areas of history. I declined participation in most projects due to time constraints but provided information.
