

Active Connections in Inglewood



Active connections are the way that people walk, bike, and use other forms of physical activity within or to travel through Inglewood. Adding sidewalks and bike routes are two ways that we are proposing to improve connectivity for people in Inglewood.




Sidewalk Connections

As part of earlier engagement in Inglewood, we heard interest in improving walkability and pedestrian safety. To help achieve this, we are proposing a number of new sidewalks where they are currently missing.

How the City identified the locations for the proposed sidewalk additions:

Sidewalk Connections



The map to the left identifies where there are existing sidewalks, where we are proposing to add new sidewalks, and where it is not feasible to add sidewalks in Inglewood.

Shared Use Path on 114 Avenue


As part of earlier engagement in Inglewood, we heard interest in adding an east to west bike route connection.

A new shared use path is proposed along 114 Avenue between Groat Road and the shared use path in Linear Park.


- 1. Review the bike route map and the shared use path concept on the roll plan.

- 3. Use a **BLUE** sticky note to tell us about any **CHALLENGES** that you can see arising from the concept.


