NEIGHBOURHOOD RENEWAL IS COMING TO GARNEAU!

The Building Great Neighbourhoods Branch of the City of Edmonton is responsible to improve infrastructure in Edmonton's neighbourhoods. In 2021, Garneau will receive new road surfaces; new sidewalks, curbs and gutters; and new street lights as part of the City of Edmonton's Neighbourhood Renewal program. Renewal can also improve other areas of the neighbourhood including intersection safety, pedestrian and bike connections, and parks and public gathering places. Arterial roads (82 Avenue, 87 Avenue, University Avenue and 109 Street) and alleys are not included. In coordination with the City's Traffic Management Program and Southside Bike Network, we will work with you to enhance safety for all who move through the neighbourhood including people who choose to walk, bike or drive.

NOW IS THE TIME TO GET INVOLVED!

Planning begins now for construction in 2021. Get involved early to share what is important to you and what changes you would like to see. This helps ensure the renewal outcome meets your needs and those of your neighbours. Start thinking about how you move, work, live and play in Garneau and how you would like to in the future. New infrastructure will be in place for the next 30 to 50 years.

A series of engagement events and activities will give you the opportunity to provide input on concepts and discuss details with the project team during the development of the Concept Plan.

The first input opportunity is the Visioning Survey, which in online now until December 7, 2018. Hard copy surveys are available at the City Arts Centre (10943 – 84 Avenue) and the Strathcona Library (8331 – 104 Street). Other ways to participate will be shared with you in the new year.

As a Garneau resident or property owner, your input will help shape the future of the neighbourhood.

HOW DECISIONS ARE MADE

Project decisions are made by the City, considering technical requirements and policies/programs, together with public input. Technical requirements include existing conditions such as roadway widths and constraints such as mature trees. City policies include current road design standards such as the Complete Streets Design and Construction Standards and others which support the City as a whole. Input from the public includes local knowledge, concerns and desires.

Every decision is different, which means the level of influence that public input, technical requirements, and City policies

have is also different for each decision. You will be asked to advise the project with local knowledge and refine design options. The City commits to telling you how public input influences decisions according the City's public engagement spectrum. Join the Garneau Working Committee

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Some residents are already focused on the future of Garneau as members of the Garneau Public Engagement Working Committee for Neighbourhood Renewal—a partnership between residents and the City.

The committee is a collaborative group formed to ensure transparency and open communication during the neighbourhood renewal project. The group is also responsible to develop new ways of engaging and communicating with residents, business owners and other community stakeholders, and to help shape the vision for the Garneau Neighbourhood Renewal.

This committee is not involved with decision making or influencing the neighbourhood design; it is focused solely on public engagement and communication. The ad-hoc committee meets once a month, during evening hours. Membership is not limited to those with a community league affiliation.

Become a Block Captain

Getting information directly to residents is key to ensuring the project's success. Garneau Block Captains share project updates with their neighbours from information provided by the project team and encourage participation in engagement activities.

Commonly Used Words in Neighbourhood Renewal

Road right-of-way – Road right-of-way defines City owned property designated for traffic and pedestrians.

Concept Design – Plan for "what" will be built, including approximate roadway and sidewalk widths, intersection design, traffic movements, and park ideas. Changes are incorporated into the design at this time.

Preliminary Design – Plan includes specific design elements such as materials, exact roadway and sidewalk widths, locations and tradeoffs for new sidewalks, confirms construction schedule and budget. Minor tweaks are incorporated into the design at this stage.

Vision Zero – A multi-national road traffic safety initiative that aims to achieve a transportation system with no fatalities or serious injuries involving road traffic.

Shortcutting – When drivers leave arterial roads and use neighbourhood roads as alternate routes. The traffic does not have a destination within the neighbourhood.
