SUMMARY

Background

In 2014, City Council approved funding for the schematic design of the Lewis Farms Facility and Park. The project is delivered by a collaboration of representatives from Edmonton Public Library, Edmonton Catholic School District, and several representatives from the City of Edmonton (architects, facility planners, facility operators, recreation programmers, and others).

The starting point for the design was based upon two Council approved plans: the 2007 Medium Term Recreation Facility and Sports Field Plan and the 2011 Lewis Farms Functional Program (high level plan). An updated facility and park program was developed based upon the Sharing Ideas public engagement.

In early 2016, the City retained services of an architectural team (Saucier + Perrotte Architects and Stantec Architecture Ltd.) to use the facility and park program to develop concept options. At the Exploring Options public engagement we presented the concept options to gather feedback from the community, potential users, and stakeholders. Based on the feedback, application of City standards, and architectural analysis, the facility and park concepts were refined to form a draft schematic design for the facility and park.

The draft schematic design was shared at the fall 2016 Setting the Direction engagement; participants were asked about their satisfaction with the design and whether they felt the design met the needs of the community. The findings from this engagement were presented to City Council and the schematic design for the facility and park was approved.

At the spring 2018 Detailing the Design engagement, we presented a draft detailed design and asked for feedback on change rooms, washrooms, and the indoor playground. Through analysis of the feedback and internal discussions with facility operators and the design team, a final design was completed. We are excited to share this final design on pg. 21 of this report.

DETAILING THE DESIGN ENGAGEMENT

Engagement Overview

This section focuses on the Detailing the Design engagement. It includes a description of the engagement activities, how we communicated with the public and stakeholders, who participated, and how they participated.

Also included is an analysis of the results from the Detailing the Design engagement which was used to finalize the design of the facility and park. A separate What You Said report can be found on our website which details all the feedback received from the public and stakeholders from this round of engagement.



Based on the feedback and analysis from previous engagements, a draft detailed design was completed. The design was

presented to the public and stakeholders during the Detailing the Design engagement. We asked you about the inclusive change rooms and washrooms, pool themes and toys, indoor playground themes and activities, and the bouldering wall. We also gathered general feedback about the facility and site designs.

We used your feedback and balanced it against other inputs such as City policies, best practices, and experience from other facilities to make decisions on changes to the design. The diagram below shows how decisions are made as part of the engagement process.

The decisions that were made during Detailing the Design are presented on page 20.

How You Participated

Public In-Person Engagement: We hosted a public engagement session at the David Thomas King School. Those who could not attend the engagement session were invited to fill out the online survey.

Internal Engagement: An engagement event took place to gather the thoughts of City staff that plan and work in/with recreation facilities and parks.

Online Survey: Accessed through

edmonton.ca/lewisfarmsfacilityandpark. A survey link was also posted on edmonton.ca/surveys. Survey respondents were asked to fill out this survey through our engagement network (i.e. user committees, community leagues, etc.) by email and Canada Post admail notifications.

Insight Panel Survey: Accessed through

edmontoninsightcommunity.ca. The Edmonton Insight Community is a group of Edmontonians that provides feedback on City policies, initiatives, and community issues through online surveys. Panel members from across Edmonton were asked if they would like to opt-in to complete the Lewis Farms Facility and Park online survey.

Sports User Committees: Meetings were held with the Aquatics Users Committee, the Gymnasiums Users Committee, and the Arenas Users Committees.

Stakeholders: Meetings were held with members from the Enoch Cree Nation, the Edmonton Skateboard Association, and the Alberta Climbing Association.

DETAILING THE DESIGN DECISIONS

What We Decided

During the Detailing the Design engagement you provided feedback and answered our questions. We used that feedback to make changes to the design and to make decisions on elements in the project. Some of your feedback is not included because it's too early for the detail level of this phase, but it will not be forgotten as we move forward in the design of the project. Here is a summary of the decisions we made and why.



Inclusive Change Rooms and Washrooms

The project team analyzed the results of the Detailing the Design engagement where we asked you whether you felt the design of the inclusive change rooms and inclusive washrooms provided safety, security, and privacy.

While you showed general support for the inclusive spaces, some of you expressed concerns with the current design. Based on that feedback we decided to modify the design.

- If a patron prefers to use a gender specific change room, there are male and female change rooms in the aquatic centre that can be accessed by users of the pool, gymnasiums, and fitness centre.
- · Every level of the recreation centre will have inclusive washrooms as well as male and female washrooms.



Aquatic Themes and Toys

You chose **beach** as the leisure & wave pool and tot pool theme. You also chose the **swing rope** and **tot slide** as your top pool toys. These will be considered as we move forward in design.



Playground Themes and Activities

You chose **nature** as the playground theme, and **adventure play** and **climbing** as top activities your child would participate in. These will be incorporated into the playground as we move forward in design.



Bouldering Wall

We heard support for the bouldering wall with many of you stating that you or your family would use this amenity. Based on this, we decided to put a 100 feet wide bouldering wall in a dedicated room.
